**GREYWELL** (or Grewell) is a parish on the river Whitewater, 2 miles south-west from Hook station on the South Western railway, 5 east from Basingstoke and 1½ west from Odiham, in the Northern division of the county, hundred of Odiham, Hartley Wintney union, Basingstoke petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Aldershot, and archdeaconry and diocese of Winchester; the Basingstoke canal passes through the parish, through a tunnel nearly one mile long, under Greywell Hill Park. The church of St. Mary is an ancient structure of flint with stone quoins and dressings, in the Norman and Early English styles, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and tower surmounted by a wooden belfry containing 4 bells: there is a handsome oak screen and rood loft: the church was restored in 1870 at a cost of £800, and affords 128 sittings. The register dates from the year 1700. The living is a vicarage, net yearly income £187, without residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Win-

chester, and held since 1902 by the Rev. Francis Charles Cole M.A. of Wadham College, Oxford. Here is a Wesleyan chapel. Greywell Hill House, the seat of the Baroness Dorchester, who is lady of the manor and principal landowner, is beautifully situated on an eminence surrounded by a park. The soil is light loam; subsoil, chalk and clay. The crops are a succession of grain. The area is 862 acres of land and 14 of water; rateable value, £1,299; the population in 1901 was 272.

**HALE** is a parish on the river Avon, 2 miles east from Breamore station, on the Salisbury and Dorchester section of the London and South Western railway, 8 south-east from Salisbury and 4 north-east from Fordingbridge, in the New Forest division of the county, hundred, union and county court district of Fordingbridge, Ringwood petty sessional division, and in the rural deanery of Ringwood and archdeaconry and diocese of Winchester. The church of St. Mary, picturesquely situated in Hale Park, is a small and plain building of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, transepts, and a central turret containing one bell: the east window is stained, and there are two others in the south transept to Joseph G. S. Goff, 1881: in the church are several monuments to the Archer family, who once held property here; one of these, dated 1743, in the south transept, is an altar tomb of marble, sculptured in Italy, with a full length reclining effigy of a man, and standing figures of his two wives, one at either end; another to Henry Archer, d. 1768, has a female figure resting on an urn; outside the south transept is a monument to Frances Chubb, d. 1644: in 1900 a brass lectern was presented by Lady Goff, in memory of her son, Lieut.-Col. Gerald Lionel Joseph Goff, and since then two stained windows have been erected in the chancel by his widow. The register dates from the year 1670. The living is a donative rectory, with North Charford annexed, net yearly value £190, with 4 acres of glebe, in the gift of Lady Adelaide Henrietta Goff, and held since 1892 by the Rev. John George Carter M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. Hale Park, the seat of Lady Adelaide Henrietta Goff, who is lady of

the manor and sole landowner, includes a handsome mansion, standing on an eminence in a park of 80 acres, and approached by an avenue about one mile in length from Hatchet Green. The soil is of a mixed character; subsoil, gravel, sand and clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and turnips. The area is 1,367 acres of land and 11 of water; rateable value, £1,223; the population in 1901 was 153 in the civil and 229 in the ecclesiastical parish.

**NORTH CHARFORD** is a parish; the name is believed to be a corruption of Cerdic's ford, where a battle was fought in 519 between Cerdic and the Britons, which resulted in the founding of the Kingdom of Wessex; the area is 759 acres; rateable value, £834; the population in 1901 was 111. North Charford, which has no church, is reputed to be extra-parochial for ecclesiastical purposes. John Coventry esq. J.P. of Burgate Manor, is lord of the manor.

**HAMBLE** (or Hamble-le-Rice) is a parish and fishing village, on a point of land where the Hamble river flows into Southampton Water, and is 2 miles south from Netley station on the London and South Western railway, and 5½ miles south-east from Southampton, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Mansbridge, union of South Stoneham, and county court district and petty sessional division of Southampton, rural deanery of Bishop's Waltham and archdeaconry and diocese of Winchester. The village is on the west side of the river Hamble, whence there is a ferry to Warsash, a village in the parish of Titchfield. The Hamble river is navigable by barges to Botley, 5

miles higher up. In 1902 the district of Satchells was transferred from the parish of Hound to this parish. The church of St. Andrew, a structure of the 14th century, consists of chancel, nave of two bays, north porch, south aisle (added in 1880 at a cost of £544), and a tower containing a clock and 3 bells: there are 230 sittings. The register dates from the year 1660. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £180, with residence, in the gift of Winchester College, and held since 1900 by the Rev. Alexander Mackintosh M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. Henville's charity of £4 3s. is for clothing. A considerable trade is carried on here in crabs and lobsters, which are imported from French,

Scotch and Irish coasts. The authorities of Winchester College, who are lords of the manor, and Tankerville Chamberlayne esq. of Cranbury Park, Winchester, are the chief landowners. The soil is light mixed; subsoil, gravelly. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 403 acres of land, 1 of water, 262 of tidal water and 284 of foreshore; rateable value, £3,833; the population in 1901 was 395.

The Training Ship "Mercury," moored in the river  
Hamble, was established in 1885 as an Institution for  
the training of boys for the Royal Navy, & for Army  
bands. It is conducted on the lines of Government  
training ships with such modifications as are necessary  
for the reception of boys of younger age, one of its  
objects being the relief of small tradesmen & others  
with large families, as well as to assist parents who  
are able to pay a small premium per annum; the  
lads are well clothed and fed & receive individual  
attention; they are received between the ages of 10 &  
15, & must either be orphans or the sons of poor  
parents; the ship is available for 150 boys, & is under  
Admiralty inspection; the ship's band of 40 per-  
formers is open for engagements; Charles Burgess  
Fry, hon. director in charge

**HAMBLEDON** is a parish and large village, 4 miles  
from Droxford station, 9 miles north-west of Havant  
station and 8 north of Cosham station, all on the Lon-  
don and South Western railway, 8 miles south-east  
from Bishop's Waltham, 10 west from Petersfield and 12  
north from Portsmouth, in the Eastern division of the  
county, Hambleton hundred, Droxford union and petty  
sessional division, Bishop's Waltham county court dis-  
trict, Droxford police district, rural deanery of Havant,  
and archdeaconry and diocese of Winchester. The  
church of SS. Peter and Paul is an edifice in the Nor-  
man and Early English styles, consisting of chancel,  
nave, aisles, and a western tower, with pinnacles, con-  
taining a clock and 6 bells: the high altar was dedicated  
16th November, 1334, by Adam de Orleton, then Bishop  
of Winchester: there is a memorial window to John  
Balderson Barkworth esq. and several other stained  
windows: the church was restored in 1876 at a cost of  
£2,611, and affords 600 sittings. The register com-  
mences in 1599. The living is a vicarage, average net  
yearly value £400, with 101 acres of glebe and resi-  
dence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since  
1911 by the Rev. Edmund Kynaston M.A. of Clare Col-  
lege, Cambridge. The charities for distribution amount  
to £29 17s. yearly. The kennels of the West Hambleton  
Hunt are in Droxford parish. There are barrows on the  
neighbouring downs. The country is richly wooded and  
very picturesque. Speltham Hill is a favourite resort of  
picnic parties from Portsmouth and other places in the  
summer season. Fairfield House, the residence of Mrs.  
Hotblack, about half a mile north-east, has extensive  
lawns and grounds, and commands fine views to the  
south and west. The Ecclesiastical Commissioners are

lords of the manor. The principal landowners are  
Winchester College, Mrs. Charnock, Captain Thomas  
Dacres Butler, A. Cooper-Dean esq. Col. Le Roi Lewis,  
the trustees of the late Sir William Pink (d. 1906) and  
the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. The soil varies from  
a light chalky soil, with little subsoil in the north and  
north-east, to a stiff clay with stiff clay for subsoil in  
the south. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats.  
The area is 9,446 acres; rateable value, £10,822; the  
population of the civil parish in 1901 was 1,922, and of  
the ecclesiastical, 1,092.
