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HAMBLE-LE-RICE, commonly called HAMBLE, is a small village and parish of 443 souls, and only about 500 acres of land, occupying the triangular point at the confluence of Southampton Water and the *Hamble Creek*, about 5 miles S.E. of Southampton. The Hamble creek is navigable for barges up to Botley, five miles above, and in it the tide is stationary for two hours at high water. (See p. 143.) Here are several oyster beds and fishermen. The latter trade largely in *lobsters*, which they buy from other fishermen on the coasts of France and Ireland. Thos. Chamberlayne, Esq., is lord of the manor of Hamble, but most of the parish is held by small copyholders. The village is on the west bank of the Hamble creek, where there is a ferry to Warsash, in Titchfield parish. *Hamble Cliff House*, which overlooks Southampton Water, is the residence of Lady Napier, and Fredk. P. W. Freeman, Esq.; and near it is *Sydney Lodge*, the delightful residence of the *Earl of Hardwicke*. commanding extensive views of the estuary, the Solent channel, New Forest, the Isle of Wight, &c. Hamble had a small alien *Priory of Oistericians* which appears to have been a *cell* to Tyrone Abbey, in France, in the early part of the 12th century. The parish CHURCH (*St. Andrew*) was built in the 14th century, and has a nave, chancel, and tower, in the transition style. It was restored and beautified a few years ago. In the interior are several neat mural tablets and an ancient font. The stained glass window over the altar was inserted in memory of the late Capt. Barton Bradby, who was accidentally drowned. It contains a representation of St. Andrew, leaning on the cross. The benefice is a *donative*, endowed with all the tithes of this small parish, and consolidated with Hound vicarage, as noticed at page 229. The incumbent has here a neat Parsonage House, called the *Rectory*, built in 1821, and having tasteful grounds. The tithes of Hamble were commuted in 1839 for £108 per annum. The parish *School* was built in 1841, at the cost of £410. The POST OFFICE is at Mrs. Ann Gill's. POST and CARRIERS daily to and from Southampton.

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FAREHAM UNION forms *Fareham Polling District*, in *South Hants*; and is in the south eastern part of the county, extending eastward from the Hamble creek and Southampton Water, along the coast nearly to Gosport; and round the western and northern shores of the extensive Harbour of Portsmouth, to the confines of the Forest of Bere. It is generally a fertile and well wooded district, finely undulated in its north eastern parts, and including *Portsdown Hill*, a long and lofty eminence,
